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



What is the Agricultural System approach?

An **Agricultural System** is a group of inter-connected elements that together create a viable, thriving agricultural sector

Agricultural Land Base



Continuous, productive land base comprised of prime agricultural areas and other lands that support agricultural production

Agri-Food Network






Infrastructure, services, and agri-food assets (processors, feed mills, etc.) important to the viability of the agri-food sector

Agricultural System Concept

- ✓ Ontarians expect government to protect farmland to support economic opportunities and provide a measure of food security.
- ✓ To make business decisions, farmers need to know the land is secure and supply chain is intact.
- ✓ Enabling the agri-food sector to grow and prosper requires deliberate, strategic planning.
- ✓ Impacts on the Agricultural System are considered before decisions are made




A thriving agri-food sector depends on a protected land base and a complete supply chain that may extend across municipal boundaries

A Place to Grow and Greenbelt Plan


- Municipalities are required to protect the agricultural land base and enhance the economic connections to the agri-food network
- Municipalities are **encouraged** to implement regional agri-food strategies and actions to sustain and enhance the agricultural system and economic prosperity





Niagara Escarpment Plan

- Prime agricultural areas in the NEP area should be identified according to the broader Agricultural System, recognizing both the agricultural land base and agri-food network
- Linkages to the Agricultural System outside the plan's area should be considered



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



Economic development:


- Discusses how to consider impacts on the Ag System when decisions are made on investments, growth, programs, policies, and services
- Introduces the agriculture economic development process and provides ideas to strengthen the prosperity of the agri-food sector depending on municipal capacity




Agricultural System Portal showing elements of the agri-food network in and around Niagara Region

Agricultural Impact Assessments (AIA)

to improve compatibility between agricultural and non-agricultural uses

- A study to evaluate potential impacts of non-agricultural development on the Agricultural System (farmland, farm operations and the agri-food network).
 - Determines how to avoid impacts (e.g., through site selection), and recommends ways to minimize and mitigate adverse impacts (e.g., through site design, use of buffers).
 - For aggregates, addresses rehabilitation to an agricultural condition where that is required.
- Provincial guidance expected to be released soon.
- A Place to Grow and Greenbelt Plan require AIAs for
 - Settlement area boundary expansions
 - Mineral aggregate operations
 - Infrastructure projects
- Niagara Escarpment Plan requires AIAs for
 - Mineral aggregate operations
 - Infrastructure projects







STAGE 1: PLANT

Prepare your community for agriculture economic development

The first step is to plant the seed:

- develop an understanding of community readiness
- build a baseline understanding of local agriculture
- identify and share opportunities for agriculture economic development
- organize an advisory committee or leadership team and
- provide direction to identified collaborators (roles and responsibilities).

STAGE 2: GROW

Getting to know your agriculture system

The next step is to build an inventory of what is going on in the *Agriculture System* in the community. From this baseline data, trends and strengths can be identified. Conversations are held about the *Agriculture System* with local collaborators. Opportunities are identified to provide the evidence needed to garner support for new initiatives:

- develop an inventory of activities taking place across the Agriculture System
- engage with the agricultural community (e.g., surveys, focus groups) and
- conduct data analysis, environmental scans and opportunity identification.

STAGE 3: HARVEST


Harvest the good ideas and take action!

After identifying community priorities, an action plan can be developed to achieve the community's goals. Across the agri-food value chain, action areas could include:

- stakeholder engagement
- communications and marketing
- business development
- workforce and leadership development





 - Supporting access to healthy, local and affordable food, urban and near urban agriculture, agri-food and agri-product businesses
 - Supporting opportunities for infrastructure, services and assets in the agri-food network. Negative impacts to the agri-food network should be assessed, minimized and mitigated
 - Consulting with agricultural advisory committees or liaison officers
- Where agricultural uses and non-agricultural uses interface, impacts to the Ag System must be avoided, minimized and mitigated; mitigation to be incorporated as part of the non-agricultural use
- Agricultural land base refinements may be proposed by the upper tier municipality for Provincial approval during municipal comprehensive review (MCR) based on provincial Implementation Procedures
 - Agricultural land base mapping applies when it is 30 incorporated into the official plan
- Agricultural land base mapping applied when it was released (2018)

- Prime agricultural areas in the plan areas should be identified according to the broader
 Agricultural System, recognizing both the agricultural land base and agri-food network
- Linkages to the Agricultural System outside the plan's area should be considered
- Impacts to prime agricultural areas must be avoided, minimized and mitigated
- Municipalities delineate and incorporate prime agricultural area mapping into their official plans including the NEP. This will occur during municipal comprehensive review
- Prime agricultural area policies in the NEP apply (e.g., permitted uses, lot creation)

Woodland Conservation By-law

Report to: Planning and Economic Development Committee

Report date: Wednesday, February 17, 2021

Recommendations

- 1. That the following Regional staff **BE APPOINTED** as Municipal By-law Enforcement Officers for the purpose of enforcing Niagara Region By-law No. 79-2020, being the Woodland Conservation By-law:
 - Cara Lampman, Manager, Environmental Planning
 - Daniel Root, Regional Forester
- 2. That the necessary by-law **BE PREPARED** and **PRESENTED** to Council for consideration.

Key Facts

- On January 31, 2021, the Woodland Conservation By-law (79-2020) came into effect and the responsibility for administration of the Woodland Conservation By-law was transferred from the Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority (NPCA) back to Niagara Region
- Niagara Region may appoint Municipal By-Law Enforcement Officers pursuant to the Police Services Act. R.S.O. 1990, c. P.15, subsection 15 (1) and when appointed are deemed Peace Officers pursuant to subsection 15 (2) of the same Act. Those appointees are further designated as Provincial Offences Officers under the Provincial Offences Act, R.S.O 1990, c. P.33, subsection 1(1)(d).
- The appointments will allow staff to ensure compliance with the Woodland Conservation By-law and escalate enforcement options when deemed necessary.

Financial Considerations

The 2021 Operating Budget for the Environmental Planning Division includes funds for staff wages, benefits and business operations.

Analysis

Section 135 of the Municipal Act allows municipalities to prohibit and regulate the destruction or injuring of trees through enacting tree bylaws. Upper-tier municipalities may enact such a bylaw for trees in woodlands as defined in the Forestry Act that are greater than one hectare. Local municipalities may also enact such a bylaw for individual trees and trees within woodlands that are less than one hectare. The Act also provides upper-tier and local municipalities with the option to delegate all or part of their power to pass such by-laws to each other, with agreement.

Niagara Region's Tree and Forest Conservation Bylaw (30-2008) has been in place since 1981. The most recent update to the bylaw occurred in 2020, in order to modernize the document as well as to facilitate the transfer of responsibilities for enforcement of the bylaw back to the Region from the NPCA (see Reports PDS 13-2019 and PDS 16-2020). The bylaw came into effect on January 31, 2021 and the name has been updated to the Woodland Conservation Bylaw (79-2020).

The Environmental Planning Division will be administering the bylaw and have hired Daniel Root as the new Regional Forester.

Enforcement provisions shall only be used when all other methods of regulatory compliance have been exhausted including voluntary compliance, restoration and education

NIAGARA'S AGRICULTURE SECTOR AND ACCESS TO UNTREATED WATER FOR IRRIGATION

WHEREAS agriculture plays a crucial role in Niagara's economy, contributing over \$1.4billion to the Regional GDP;

WHEREAS The Province of Ontario has identified agricultural lands in Niagara through the Greenbelt Plan, Growth Plan and Niagara Escarpment Plan with a vision to protect against their loss and support their viability;

WHEREAS Niagara farms play an important role in ensuring Ontario's food security;

WHEREAS Niagara farms also produce value add products which contribute to increased jobs and tax revenues;

WHEREAS climate change has resulted in more frequent cycles of drought like conditions;

WHEREAS the Niagara Irrigation Committee, a subcommittee of the Agricultural Policy Action Committee, has determined growers are willing to invest in a more sustainable system for access to untreated water for irrigation;

WHEREAS agricultural infrastructure, including irrigation is supported by Provincial and Regional policies;

WHEREAS a system that relies on gravity is the most economical way to provide that water;

WHEREAS certain reservoirs and channels that are in the control of the Ontario Power Generation Corp (OPG) have been determined to meet the criteria of a gravity fed system;

WHEREAS the Irrigation Committee has met with the OPG at the staff level and was told there was no interest in entering into an agreement with growers for access to their infrastructure;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. That the Regional Chair BE DIRECTED to Request the Minister of Energy to initiate a meeting with the Senior VP of Renewable Generation & Energy Markets at OPG, Mayor Sendzik, Committee Chair Bill Schenck, APAC Chair Albert Witteveen to discuss the role of OPG power generation in developing an agriculture irrigation system for Niagara.
- 2. That the Regional Council BE DIRECTED through the CAO/Public Works Director to provide staff support to assist the Irrigation Committee in developing a Niagara Region Irrigation Water Utility Board.
