	 Therefore, Niagara Region is requesting a \$3.1 M investment be directed to the respective municipalities for this digital technology to be implemented in order to ensure the seamless operation of all emergency service voice radio systems. With Niagara Emergency Medical Services (EMS) operating an advanced Ambulance Communications Service (ACS), it is prepared to be an early adopter of the implementation of the PSRN with full integration to the local P25 digital system. This model will help inform the Province of similar initiatives for successful implementation across all municipalities. As Niagara is well underway in the transition to NG911 for its Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP), it is prepared to be an early adopter of NG911 with full integration to the provincial NG911 system to be used for its ACS's. This model will help inform the Province of the requirements to ensure for successful implementation across all municipalities.

This financial challenge can be alleviated by maintaining operational funding at 2021 levels at minimum (as opposed to the currently planned provincial reductions for 2022), to ensure the sustainability of service providers, and prevent further increases to parent fees With the potential roll-out of a national child care program, the Region is requesting that the Province include municipal partners in its planning for the negotiations with the federal government.
