Key Policies Issues

- Evaluating provincial agricultural regulations within the Greenbelt and how they affect farmers and growers
- Synchronizing local, regional and provincial policies on land use planning
- Building the East/West Corridor to relieve congestion on QEW
- Extension of natural gas into rural areas
- Broadband connectivity for rural areas to support precision agriculture
- Resolving irrigation issues
- Raising public awareness about local food production systems
- Aligning regional cluster strategies with federal and provincial agribusiness innovation programs

Current Gaps & Challenges

- Lack of a legitimate institutional platform for a cohesive strategic visioning and planning
- A governance architecture to mobilize key actors (private sector, postsecondary institutions, research centres, various levels of government, and other community groups)

- WHEREAS Niagara's Agribusiness sector was the focus of a recent policy brief conducted by the Niagara Community Observatory;
- WHEREAS Agribusiness is one of Niagara's top economic sectors contributing \$1.41 billion towards GDP, 215,000 acres of farmland, and almost 20,000 jobs in Niagara;
- WHEREAS gaps have been identified in the sector's production, processing, distribution chains, and value-added opportunities;
- WHEREAS economic trends indicate that the agribusiness sector in Niagara is growing;
- WHEREAS Niagara's agribusiness sector would benefit from an established network for strategic visioning and planning that incorporates and aligns with a variety of stakeholders from across the Region including farmers, entrepreneurs, workers, industry associations, political representatives and relevant educational representatives;
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That Regional Council DIRECT the Planning and Economic Development Department to initiate a meeting with relevant stakeholders to determine the potential for establishing an "Agribusiness Strategic Planning Workgroup".
